

Renal Unit

As I write this, Ginny and I have spent a whole year in our roles as Joint Clinical Director, and it seems appropriate, in this year which marks the 50th anniversary of the St Helier Renal Unit, to reflect on things past, whilst celebrating the present, and looking to the future.

Fifty years ago, dialysis as a long term treatment for people with irreversible kidney failure was in its infancy. The 'artificial kidney' was very different to the modern machines we use today, and patients would dialyse for 12-14 hours at a time, twice a week. There were just two patients on long term dialysis when St Helier renal unit opened its doors. Peritoneal dialysis as we know it now was not available until the 1980's. Now we have over 1000 patients on dialysis. Of course prevention is better than cure, and medical science cannot yet 'fix' damaged kidneys, but there are many conditions where the treatments we have now can prevent kidneys from failing, or at least make them last longer, postponing the need for dialysis.

Fifty years ago, kidney transplantation was a very new concept, with the first kidney transplant from a deceased donor only having been performed in 1965. Whilst there were drugs available to suppress the immune system and prevent rejection, there were significant complications and far fewer transplants were successful then

compared to now. In 2019, 96 patients under our care received a transplant, and we expect the average transplanted kidney to last between 10 and 15 years. This is fantastic progress.

One of the ways we are celebrating our 50th year is a day of talks, memories and baking. If you would like to drop into this event you are very welcome –it's in the Whitehall Room in the Education Centre at St Helier Hospital on November 22nd running for most of the day. There is one thing that has not changed much in 50 years, though, and that is the building that we are housed in. There continues to be much discussion about how we might resolve this issue, and Ginny and I have become very familiar with looking at architect drawings, but a solution that is workable is yet to be agreed. Without being too cynical, it is worth noting that Dr James Marsh, the Clinical Director 10 years ago,

wrote in the 40th anniversary edition of this magazine that we were partnering with St George's Hospital to bid for the opportunity to provide a new renal unit in Surrey, for our Surrey patients. Ten years later, we are still in the same building. On the positive side, we are working in partnership with Frimley Health so at least some of our Surrey patients have more local access to care, and we are very excited to have recently learned that Epsom and St Helier is one of six hospitals to receive a share of £2.7 billion of government funding earmarked to rebuild crumbling hospitals. We are hopeful that this will one day mean wards and clinical areas fit for the 21st century. Watch this space...

In the meantime, we 'push on' with what we have. Our Renal Day Unit has been open for just over a year. Staff wonder how we managed without it, and feedback from you, the patients that use it, has been overwhelmingly positive. We are delighted to welcome new nursing Matrons to support our nursing teams and work closely with our senior doctors, always with the aim of improving the service that we provide. We have several exciting projects underway, which we will share

as plans become more concrete!
We are sorry, though, to be
losing our General Manager, Mr
Steve Simper, who is moving to a
new role within the Trust, having
supported the renal unit for a
number of years. His dry humour
and calm demeanour will be
missed, but we look forward to
working with Mrs Ciara Jones,

who will be joining us as our new GM in late October.

And finally, it occurs to me that working in the NHS is a bit like my attempts at gardening. No matter how hard I work, there are always things to be done. With the best plans and preparation, things don't always come to fruition. As the weather

gets colder, and the autumn leaves start to fall, we know that 'winter pressures' will increase the daily challenges of working in the NHS but in my garden, the pale pink cyclamen are pushing through the earth underneath the oak tree resilient in adversity!

I usually try to be upbeat when telling stories of my life, but this has been a difficult few months. I am reminded that we only truly appreciate the light when coming out of the shadows.



"Necessity is the mother of invention" Plato

Once again I have the pleasure in sending autumnal greetings to all you readers of *Renality*, supporters of The Kidney Fund and... to our many readers all over the world... to misquote the wonderful Nicholas Parsons – who by the way has just turned 96!

So, what tales do I have to tell you from the labs of SWTIRR? Well, as many of you know the last few years have been a little difficult for our parent charity The Kidney Fund.

And this has meant that I have had to cut the coat according to our cloth. Nationally, charitable giving has been rising; I think it was 2.7% last year, so we have sadly been bucking the trend. I should say things may be looking up for us with Robin Ford chairing the Fundraising subcommittee and Anita's work on the web site. Apparently, on-line fundraising was up 17%, so the web site could be really important. Why don't you let us know what you would like to see

Anyway, back to what I've been doing. Just because we have less money doesn't mean

there is less need for research and the improvements in kidney care that follow. So, I have been looking elsewhere.

As you guys know better than most

people kidney disease brings with it many other problems, not least cardiovascular disease you know problems with blood vessels and your heart-this is one of the main causes of death and disease in renal patients. Cardiovascular disease is a big problem worldwide but the type you see in renal patients is different - you lot would be different wouldn't you? I've been trying to look at cardiovascular disease in renal patients. We set up some preliminary experiments which went pretty well. They certainly showed that we were going in the right direction but when we took

the results to Kidney Research UK, they weren't convinced. So I went to Professor Cathy Shanahan, a brilliant Australian researcher working in London who is an expert in the field.

Cathy was more impressed than Kidney Research UK with our results and she suggested another set of experiments that might give more evidence to support

our theory. Hard to do when you don't have any money. But last summer Helena Harman, Annabel's daughter, came and did some voluntary work in the Institute to carry out the suggested experiments. The results look good; consequently Cathy and I are going to apply to the British Heart Foundation for a grant. Keep your fingers crossed for us.

Continuing to look for new sources of money for our vital research, Professor Bruce Hendry, the chairman of The SWTIRR board of directors, and I went up to Cambridge to visit AstraZeneca, one of the world's largest Pharmaceutical companies. Our plan was to show them some of the best research from SWTIRR and see if we could interest them in supporting us. For a first meeting it went quite well, they were particularly interested in some of our novel markers of early kidney disease. They're arranging a follow up meeting

next month in the US, where we'll meet some of their international team leaders. So, we'll keep at it and see where it goes, I promise I'll let you know.

The last bit of news I wanted to share with you is a little different. Some of you may remember that a few years ago I did some work with one the renal dieticians, Caroline. Well, following on from that I have been having some meetings with another one of our amazing dieticians, Fiona Doyle. Fiona is concerned about how we assess the nutritional health of some our most vulnerable patients. So, we have been putting together a plan of how she might be able to improve on the current

practice. I really enjoy this kind of thing, not just because of the direct help it gives to patients but because I have to think out of my comfort zone and learn new stuff. Look out for Fiona's posters in the renal unit and I'll ask her to write something for the next edition of Renality.

Last week I was visiting another 96 year old, not Nicolas Parsons but my dear old mum. She was asking about the Institute, my mum has been a big donor to the Fund. She was a bit worried about how much work I was doing and all the running around trying to get funding. She asked if there wasn't something less tiring I could be doing but I had to explain to her. I'm very lucky

that the kidney patients have put their trust in me to do this work and if I don't do it who will?

Many years ago my mother introduced me to the writings of the wise rabbi Jonathan Sacks. He made a slight adjustment to that quote from Plato I started with: "Hope, even more than necessity, is the mother of invention." Hope for a better future for kidney patients, hope for a cure is what drives me forward, and I believe it will come through research.

Funding = Research Research = Cure!

A message from your Chairman



I am nearing the end of my thirteenth year as Chairman and I am more than happy to continue for another year. I hope that the KPA members, patients and the renal unit staff are pleased with the work that the KPA's Committee has done on your behalf over the last year. On a personal note I would like to thank all the Committee members, all our Volunteers including those on the Servery together with the Renal Unit staff all of whom provide invaluable support to the KPA throughout the year.

St Heliers HD dialysis unit has moved to a brand spanking new unit in the main hospital in the Summer of 2019 following some delays.

The new Mayday dialysis unit has been delayed yet again, so patients will have to wait until the Spring of 2020.

This year the renal unit has seen more than a few changes with the appointment of joint Clinical Directors, Dr Ginny Quan and Dr Fiona Harris. We have seen the appointment of Matrons overseeing various disciplines and some administration staff have either left or changed roles.

The move of the renal wards to the main hospital is still proposed but no definite date has been agreed, in the meantime Beacon ward may need to move to the old haemodialysis area as it's considered to be past its sell by date!!

About the KPA, we have 890 members, so we're kept busy dealing with the many and varied requests which we receive from both patients and the renal unit. As in previous years I thought it would be good to show how we have distributed our funds during the past year, albeit some of the items below are still to be purchased we have agreed to their funding. These include,

- 2 Profiling beds and pressure relieving mattresses for St Helier.
- 2 Ultrasound machines for St Helier.

- Thrombectomy machine for St Helier.
- Renal Overlays for St Helier and its Satellites.
- 8 Blood Pressure machines for St Helier & Mayday.
- 10 bag warmers for P.D.
- 6 Laptops and cows for St Helier wards and Specialist Nurses.
- Stryker Trolley for Day Unit.
- Weighing scales for Mayday.
- Financial assistance with Holiday Allowances, Travel Benefits and Amenity payments.
- Financial support of the participants in the
 St Helier Team at the
 Transplant Games.
- Supply dementia friendly clocks and patient recliner chairs.
- Biopsy Training Aid.

This has all been possible due to the generous donations that we have received, and fund-

raising events reported upon in previous editions.

We also received a legacy which has allowed us to purchase or agree to purchase some quite highly priced equipment listed above.

This year we have purchased equipment valued at over £105,000 for either St Helier or its Satellites

With this edition you will find our Grand Draw tickets and whilst I know that times are really tough for some of you could I please urge you to purchase them if possible as this is one of our main fundraisers and makes a huge difference to our funds and our ability to continue to help the Unit, it's Satellites and its Patients.

friends and family about your decision as they will always have the final say even after the law changes to presumed consent (and rightly so).


