As the last Renality went to press the Renal Unit was about to celebrate 50 years of kidney medicine at St Helier - I am sure that photographs of both the staff event - complete with Dialysis Machine Birthday Cake, and of the 50th event within the renal unit will appear later in this edition. A couple of moments stick firmly in both our minds-the first is the picture of three true stalwarts of the Renal Unit Drs Eisinger, Bending and Kwan underneath the 50 year banner. The second is of Daniel Elkeles' face as he wondered if he would really be able to try all 20 cakes at the bake off. The 50th celebrations were supported by funding from the Kidney Patient's Association - we are incredibly grateful for this and for all the other support they provide. Most recently we have asked for their help in purchasing monitors and specialized oxygen equipment. We are hoping to be able to cohort some of the sickest renal inpatients together so we can provide increased care and use this equipment for them if needed - we are aiming for this initiative to start in April/May time.

The unit continues to grow

- at the start of February we
welcomed Dr Louise Ross previously a registrar in the
unit, who has been appointed
to a consultant post working
between St Helier and Frimley
Park. This brings the total

number of consultants working within the unit to 24, although some of us work in other disciplines as well – either acute medicine or ITU – and of course most of us spend between 1 and 3 days providing renal services in other hospitals. The consultant

Excluding the squirrels, we all have specialized interests and roles within the renal services. So, as well as working within the renal service at Frimley, Dr Ross will be running Peritoneal Dialysis (PD) clinics here at St Helier. She will support Dr Sood and Dr Somalanka in inserting PD catheters with the long-term aim of being able to offer some peritoneal dialysis services more locally to Frimley. Having the ability to insert PD catheters without general anesthetic has helped us to develop a responsive service and enables people who need to start dialysis

quickly to start with Peritoneal Dialysis if they choose to do so.

Many of the dialysis satellite units were set up several years ago and we are in the process of retendering for these units to be provided, however the landlord at the Purley unit no longer wants to continue to rent the building to our partners. We have therefore had to take the difficult decision to move patients from Purley to either Epsom or Sutton satellite units until we can find a suitable venue in Purley to provide dialysis there. We really appreciate how difficult this is for some patients and apologies if you have been affected by this, but we have no option to stay in the current building. On a more positive note we are finally moving forward on building the new dialysis unit at Croydon, and as of this month work has started on removing asbestos with the intention to start building works at the

beginning of March. I wish I could give a similar definite answer to when and where Beacon ward will move to but that is still under discussion, however unlike the consultant portacabin it has not as yet been invaded by squirrels. As well as the inpatient beds the renal day unit is now sited in Beacon, with an ever-increasing throughput. We feel this has improved the way we work and it has had fantastic feedback from patients using it-if you have needed to use it and do have any comments please let us know

Returning to the 50th celebration on November 22nd, even more memorable that the bake off was the set of 8 talks compèred by David Makanjuola in a 90 minute run detailing many of the pathways that patients and staff are involved in throughout the unit. It started with a talk on research from one of the PhD students in the institute. Under the coordination of Dr Pauline

Swift there is an enormous amount of clinical research and involvement in clinical trials that goes on within the unit. There is also more basic scientific research looking at the causes of kidney damage going on in the institute led by Dr Mark Dockrell. Xinlu's talk described how basic research can cross the lab to ward interface and translate into patient benefit. The program finished with ten minute snapshots of the different modes of dialysis and transplantation and how those pathways have been navigated by 3 patients and their families. It really brought home the number of interactions that are vital to run the unit and how patients and staff can work together to achieve better results. As ever we are always happy to be contacted if you have any comments about how things could be improved or what works well.

My name is Ciara



I am the new Divisional Director of Operations for Epsom and St Helier Renal services. I joined the NHS in 2007 as a graduate management trainee and have worked in hospitals since then. I have worked at Epsom and St Helier for the last five years, in a number of roles. During that time, I have worked closely with the renal team - including on the development of the inpatient service at Frimley Park Hospital. When the chance arose to manage the renal service, I was delighted to be given the opportunity.

I live in Wallington with my husband and two young children. Between work and family life I am usually kept very busy, but in a quiet moment I enjoy knitting and embroidery and I am learning to sew (very slowly!).

It has been a whirlwind few months for me since starting in November and I thought I would share my observations of our renal services as a newcomer, and my priorities for the coming months and years.

It's clear that estates are a huge problem for us at St Helier. We have a really dedicated clinical team who provide services in completely substandard environments. We are working on a plan to redevelop the renal unit at St Helier but we know that will take months or even years to come to fruition. That doesn't mean we can't make improvements in the meantime, and we are working

on developing a new therapy room for our inpatients, as well as creating an additional room in outpatients and making some improvements to the waiting situation for phlebotomy.

The dialysis unit at the front of St Helier hospital is a great reminder of how much better our environment can be, and we are currently in the process to award to new suppliers to have our other dialysis units rebuilt or refurbished. This will be a phased approach and as soon as we have more information about each unit, we'll update you.

Patients who dialyse at Purley will know that we have had to temporarily close the unit there, and our priority will be to get a new Purley unit back up and running as soon as possible.

Along with our Head of Nursing, Susie, I went out to Purley for a couple of days in January to talk to our patients about the changes we were making. Although I was bringing such disappointing news, it was helpful for me to talk to so many of our patients about their views on our service. I would like to be able to talk to more of you, more often. I know that being on dialysis is already a big part of your daily life, but if anyone reading this feels they can give any time to being part of a lunchtime meet-up from time to time and talk about how we could improve services and to provide views on specific issues, please pop in and see me in the corridor at St Helier or drop me an email

on Ciara.jones@nhs.net. I don't have a phone yet but if you want to phone, you can call Rebecca Roffey on 020 8296 2627 to express an interest.

Something else that I already knew but which was underlined for me while I was at Purley, was that transport can be a big problem for some of you. Our transport team have made a significant investment and have been working on improvements but if it still is not working for all of you, we need to know. We'll be setting up a new way to report transport issues in the next couple of months and will be advertising it in our dialysis units, so please do keep an eye out.

We have recently made some changes to the way Renality is distributed due to data protection regulations and some people may not have received a copy who usually do (as you need to opt in). You can call Rebecca to let her know if would like to receive a copy of Renality and you don't currently, and she can add you to the 'opt in' list. You can also receive a copy electronically, so if you are trying to reduce your environmental footprint, please let us know and we can arrange this.

I'm sure that this doesn't cover all of what we need to do, but we will continue to be focused on making improvements and I look forward to getting to know many of you more over the coming months and hearing from you about what really matters to you.



And if this is true of a new day, then oh so much more of a new year. Happy 2020 to all you Renaliteers.

2020, is that a new decade? I've heard some debate, apparently there is an opinion that we should wait another 12 months to celebrate the new decade. Whether that's true or not I would like to share with you what may be a new direction for your research here at SWTIRR.

Those of you who saw the splendid June edition of Renality may remember me in introducing you to the current Kidney Fund Clinical Research Fellow,

Dr Giulio Podda. There were a couple of projects that I had in mind for Giulio but I thought it might be a good idea to hear what Giulio might want to do. After some discussion and thinking, we started to hatch a plan to initiate a project on acute kidney injury, AKI.

Some of you might think that a little curious, after all, the Institute has always had a strong focus on chronic kidney disease, CKD. I know that I don't have to explain to Renaliteers the difference between these two forms of kidney disease but just in case there are less well informed individuals sneaking a peak indulge me a little. Traditionally we think of AKI as an abrupt event when your kidneys suddenly stop

working properly. This can be caused by a variety of things such as an infection or a bad reaction to certain drugs. CKD on the other hand, as most of you know, is a long term condition that can get worse over time

and eventually may result as complete kidney failure. So, AKI and CKD are quite different and never the twain shall meet. Well, that's what we used to think. As it turns out things are not quite so simple. A significant number of people who suffer an AKI go on to develop CKD, this is only minority of people, about 1 in 5, but significant none the less. And people with CKD are more susceptible to AKI. So, you can see that Giulio's interests are not so far from our own.

There are other people studying AKI but they tend to use animal models. Some of you may know that, in general, I prefer to use human cells to study human disease. In addition, Giulio points out there are many significant differences between mice and men, some of which are highly relevant in AKI. So, we have started a novel approach setting up models of AKI using human cells in the lab. It's always difficult starting something new but we won't find new answers if we don't ask new questions. Through some hard work and harder thinking we've made some real progress. We have put together a collaboration between ourselves, our renal consultant Dr Joe Wang, Dr Simon Winn the St Helier Acute Medicine lead and Professor Lui Forni from the University

of Surrey and have applied to Kidney Research UK for a fellowship for Giulio to continue this work. Keep your fingers crossed for us.

Of course, starting a new project doesn't mean we've stopped the rest of our work. Pritpal Virdee has found some time in his busy clinical schedule to come back to the lab to continue his work on a new therapy for kidney fibrosis. Sarah is still working on the K-cad test for early diagnosis of diabetic kidney disease. Ekram is analysing samples from the transplant patients who were involved in Dr Louise Ross's study on dietary salt. Xinlu has just submitted a paper for publication on some of her work, pretty good for a PhD student. Next month we will be joined by Dr Matt James from Darent Valley Hospital for a couple of

weeks. Matt would like to learn some research technique and he'll be working on the cardiorenal project I told you about in October's Renality.

And me? What have I been up to? I've been writing a paper on some of our research. I've also been writing some grant applications to try and fund our research; I'm currently trying Diabetes UK and the Wellcome Trust. I have, at long last, managed to launch our new web site with much help from Steve Simper - www.swtirr.org.uk, have a look and tell me what you think.

As usual I have been dealing with all your enquiries about our research. In fact I have it right here in front of me; a letter from Mrs Trellis of North Wales. "Dear Dr Duck Well, I wrote to you last

year about being a PRATT and you've done nothing about it. I think you're a bit of a quack."

Well Mrs Trellis and all other potential PRATTS, I can do nothing but apologise. I have not forgotten and I still want to set up a Patients' advisory group for our research. Actually, we didn't have many replies to my appeal you obviously don't find me very appealing. But I was speaking to Sarah-Louise at Kidney Research UK and she has offered some help. So please be patient with me, I'm still working on it.

If you feel like joining Mrs Trellis and dropping me a line, I'd love to hear from you. In the meantime, remember...

Obituary

Peter Simpson 13 November 1931 - 24 January 2020

It was with great sadness we learned of the passing of Peter Simpson.

Peter and his wife Margaret worked tirelessly for the patients of St Helier Hospital and were instrumental in raising the profile of the St Helier Renal Unit. In the 30 years we had known Peter he was chair of the St Helier KPA, the Kidney Fund Frimley Park and Guildford Branch and an Executive Committee member of the SW Thames Institute for Renal Research.

In 1990 Peter, Richard Sammons and Dr Michael Bending started

a campaign to raise funds for the building of a Research Institute at St Helier. The Institute was opened in November 1998 by Lord Rogers of Riverside.

In November 2002 he, with wife Margaret as editor, founded of *Renality*, initially sending out 1700 copies from their dining room! BUT, Dr Kwan wanted all patients to have the newsletter so "stuffing" moved to the Blue Room at St Helier and by 2011 the newsletter had developed from black and white to 20 full colour pages being sent to 6000 patients and staff.

Actively supporting Kidney
Patients for over 20 years Peter
and Margaret decided they
should have some time together
and stepped back Unfortunately
it wasn't to last long as Margaret
passed away 27 February 2014
so in November 2015 Peter
decided to move to Wales to be
near his family.

Wonderful friends and great ambassadors for kidney patients are sadly missed. Together again – RIP.

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
